Beloved Family in Christ,

Philoptochos News

I have mixed feelings as I write my final article for the Shepherd's Staff. After nearly six years as Metropolis of Detroit Philoptochos President, my final term will end on September 30 when elections take place at the Metropolis Conference in Buffalo. It has been a privilege to serve with such a wonderful Board and under the spiritual guidance and support of His Eminence, Metropolitan Nicholas.

If not for being elected president in 2011, I would have missed the opportunity of getting to know so many of my Philoptochos sisters, both at the chapter and National levels. Many have become good friends over the years. It has also been an honor to serve on the National Board Executive Committee and I hope my contributions at that level have had a positive impact.

I continue to be truly amazed at the creativity and dedication of my sisters in Philoptochos. Rarely, if ever, do you hear the word, "No" when they are asked to do even more...they always find the way to do it. One of my favorite sayings is one I heard from Fr. John Bakas at the National Convention in Los Angeles: "We are angels with only one wing. We can only fly by holding on to one another."

My personal circumstances have curtailed chapter visitations the past two years but, thankfully, the internet and "ma bell" have kept us connected. I encourage chapter presidents to always communicate and build an alliance with the next Metropolis President, the conduit to the National Board.

The electoral process, which thankfully occurs every two years, took place this year. We are grateful that so many of our new chapter presidents have come into office with new ideas and enthusiasm. Although elected in May, they really start their term at the beginning of the Ecclesiastical year, after a summer of preparation. All active chapters in our Metropolis have been ratified by Archbishop Demetrios, the first Metropolis to do so.

On August 10-12, I was able to attend the National Philoptochos Executive Board meeting in New York where many decisions were made, including the disbursements of funds. We were asked to take men's tee shirts and shorts so they could be passed out to the homeless at their monthly Feeding the Hungry initiative. Bishop Sevastianos, our National Spiritual Advisor, always participates with the women who help to prepare and serve the meals. The National goal is to serve 1,000 000 meals by July 2018.

My last visitation was traveling to Memphis with fellow



National Board member and keynote speaker Arlene Siavelis Kehl the weekend of August 18-20. The inaugural fundraiser benefiting the Cancer and Other Major Illnesses Fund, "An Evening Celebrating the Theotokos", was spearheaded by Emily Capadalis Love and Tina Taras Liollio, both of whom lost loved ones to cancer. Initially a dream of their mothers, they fulfilled a promise made to them many years ago. It was a wonderful affair down to the last detail. Earlier that day, Metropolis Board member Dr. Stephanie Storgion Poplos and newly elected chapter president Elizabeth Hawkins (the first female Orthodox chaplain) toured us around Memphis and the St. Jude Hospital campus. The tour ended with a visit to the Le Bonheur Children's Hospital where both are on staff, Elizabeth as a chaplain and Stephanie as Pediatric Intensivist and Medical Director of Neuro Intensive Care and Intermediate ICU. We were able to meet a few of the children in the critical care unit. Love radiated from the eyes of every employee we met. Why Le Bonheur, you ask? Because they were the recipient of grants from the National Philoptochos totaling \$36,000. The hospital has approximately 250 beds for children and never turns a child away from treatment because of the financial hardship of the parents. Along with their Elpis chapter, the National Philoptochos is on the donor board.

Contributions

- Chapter National Commitments for 2016 -\$118,161.29 (78% of chapters paid all 19 National commitments).
- Chapter National Commitments for 2017 are on track to exceed this amount.
- \$ 115,000 aid to the people of Greece and Cyprus on July 3, 2017.

MEFGOX News

Seventy years ago, the beginnings of MEFGOX emerged during the first Convention of church musicians at Oglebay Park, PA. Present were then-Archbishop Athenagoras I and founding clergy, the Reverend Fathers John Berris, James Bouras, John Geranios, John Kapenekas, and Theotokis N. Pappas. Since then, the Mid-Eastern Federation of Greek Orthodox Church Musicians has been working to serve the music ministries of their parishes as the longestserving Federation among all the Metropolises of our Archdiocese, growing from three states to seven and from 11 participating parishes to 65 in the Pittsburgh and Detroit Metropolises.

MEFGOX conducts several types of programs. It offers workshops and Church Music Institutes to provide resources and improve the practices of choir members, chanters, and those working in children's music programs. It offers assistance to clergy regarding their church music needs. It publishes the BYZANTINE ECHO, distributed electronically, to more than 1200 church musicians and clergy. The Federation also funds a Memorial Scholarship Program and each year awards scholarships to deserving young people who have served and will continue to serve their parishes in church music. Annually, Federation members gather for a Convention, where they learn new music, attend workshops about their faith as well as vocal instruction, and sing together as a massed choir at the Sunday Divine Liturgy.

This year's 70th Annual Convention was hosted by St. Spyridon Church in Monessen, PA on July 20th - 23rd. The theme was **"Celebrating the Past - Working on the** Future." The choir sang the Doxology and Divine Liturgy in English, using the English translation recently approved by our Holy Synod for the first time at one of our Conventions. Two of our young people and past Scholarship recipients led the group: Thespina Christulides from Holy Cross in Pittsburgh was Guest Director and Nicholas Bodle from St. Paul in North Royalton was Guest Accompanist. College-bound recipients of three \$1000 scholarships were announced at the Grand Banquet: Maria Cook from Holy Trinity in Toledo, OH; Victoria Martine of Holy Trinity in Carmel, IN; and Socrates Papageorgiou from St. Nicholas in Ann Arbor, MI. Also at the Convention, Deacon Vasilios Leogas from St. Spyridon was awarded the Patriarch Athenagoras Medal for Outstanding Metropolis Contributions to Church Music.

Next year, the Federation anticipates implementing a new Continuing Education Grants program for church musicians interested in furthering their skills. Also on schedule is to re-establish a program of regional workshops to bring more knowledge and skill-building to the local level. Detroit Metropolis officers who were elected include Vicki Pappas as President, Anna Niforos as Vice-President, and District Supervisors Barbara Minton for the Detroit Metro area, Cynthia Afendoulis for the Outstate Michigan parishes, and Martha Payne for Indiana and Kentucky, with the New York area TBA. Other Detroit metropolis church musicians serve on the Stewardship, Scholarship, Church Music Institutes, Byzantine Echo, and Continuing Education Committees.

The Mid-Eastern Federation expresses its thanks to our two Hierarchs, Metropolitan Nicholas and Metropolitan Savas and all their Metropolis staff members for the assistance and support they give to MEFGOX.



Dormition

In many novels, we find a prologue and an epilogue, which serve as bookends to the main content of the story and serve, respectively, as an introduction and a summary of the plot, characters, and motivations that are in play during the plot of the story. While it can be tempting to view these sections as superfluous, they provide a lens for the primary thematic elements of a story to be relevant beyond the immediate character's arc.

It should come as no surprise that the Church calendar is put together in a very deliberate way. The "New Year" for Orthodox Christians is celebrated on September 1st and the distribution of feasts along the annual trajectory is not capricious. The first "Great Feast" of the year is celebrated on September 8th, the "Nativity or Birth of the Theotokos," and the last Great Feast is celebrated on August 15th, the "Dormition of the Theotokos." Celebrations on the Orthodox calendar are arranged in a deliberate manner, intended to convey connections between the various disparate moments commemorated in the Orthodox Liturgical life. For instance, the Annunciation is commemorated on March 25th, nine months before the birth of Christ at Christmas. The same can be said of the intervals between the conceptions, births, and deaths commemorated elsewhere on the calendar.

It should come as no great surprise that the Church first teaches us about the greatness of the Theotokos and Mother of Christ by beginning the Liturgical year with her birth as the first Great Feast and then concluding with the end of her life, her Dormition, as the last feast of the liturgical year.

Interestingly, on the Feast of the Dormition, the Church reads the Gospel passage at Liturgy – not about the Mother of God, but of Mary and Martha – and ends it with the dialogue between Christ and a woman in the Crowd who says, "Blessed is the womb that bore you and the breasts where you nursed" but Christ responds, "Blessed are those who hear the word of God and keep it."

The greatness of our Mother, the Theotokos, is not simply in her having given birth to Christ devoid of any other attributes, but in the qualification that Christ gives for her blessedness: "Blessed are they who hear the word of God and keep it."



From her first hearing that she would bear the Christ from the Archangel Gabriel, to Christ's Presentation in the Temple and even at the Wedding Feast of Cana, His mother is continuously described as having "kept things and pondered them in her heart." (Luke 2:19).

We learn from this that it is not mere formality of relationship that will save us or make us blessed. What makes the Theotokos blessed is the quality by which she lives out that relationship. **She not only "hears the word of God," but also keeps it.** There are deep gaps of silence between the chronicled events that the Theotokos experienced and what she is recorded to have said. From this we learn the depth of Wisdom over Knowledge. There is the Annunciation, the "knowing" of things, and then its living out or the "wisdom" of acting on that word of God once we have received it.

This injunction to not only hear the words, the theological facts about God, but to keep them, and to act on them at the right moment is essential to the thrust of both our corporate liturgical life and our individual struggle.

Immediately after the beginning of the New Ecclesiastical Year, we are bidden to follow the life of this great lady from its beginning (Sept. 8th) to its end (Aug. 15th) in the hope that having received from Christ we might realize both the truth of what we need to act on, as well as the Wisdom of finding the right moment in which to apply those facts for the profit and salvation of our souls. Amen.
